Written by Cal McCrystal and directed by Bichu Shimellis, **Circus Abyssinia: Ethiopian Dreams** is an unashamedly joyful family show brimming with astonishing stunts and enchanting adventure. Inspired by the magical true tale of brothers **Bibi and Bichu**, who dreamed as little boys of joining the circus and grew up to help raise a phenomenal new tradition of circus in Ethiopia, the show weaves their story through death-defying tricks and stunning ensemble feats of **juggling, human juggling, contortion, hoop-diving and Chinese pole**. This is a joy-driven journey through Ethiopia's rich and storied artistic traditions and a transformative celebration of circus itself.

The absence of circus tradition in Ethiopia means that most acrobats never get to make a living by their skills. Where Bibi and Bichu grew up, no circus ever rolled into town; they carved their own juggling clubs out of wood and learned their skills busking for crowds on the dusty city streets of Jimma. At 14 and 15 years old they **journeyed overseas to perform at Brighton Fringe** and the response of audiences and performers blew them away, teaching them for the first time that what they could do was extraordinary!

As jugglers, Bibi and Bichu have met with more success than they ever dared hoped for, this year even starring in **Disney and Tim Burton's Dumbo** (2019). But most important to them both is the very real possibility of social change circus holds for their country: since 2010 they've been funding **circus schools in Addis Ababa** and there discovered the incredible artists who now tour with them in Circus Abyssinia – artists who started out like they did, honing their skills on city streets, with no expectation of pay. All now bread-winners for their families, the cast have performed their astounding signature feats of strength, dexterity and fluid grace across the globe, from **Asia to Australia to Broadway New York**.

Thrumming with the living rhythms and vibrant traditions of contemporary Ethiopia, Circus Abyssinia is 'not an archaic expression of African culture but [an exploration of] the richness of culture, outstanding talent and exuberant joy that modern Ethiopians have to offer' (Broadway World). Together the cast perform **a celebration of dreams**, of the people who make them possible and the power in all of us to fight for them. They use the **wonderful surreal language of circus** to tell their stories - how they dreamed up the circus as children and how they live out their dreams today.

## Bibi and Bichu will bewitch you

Circus Abyssinia: Ethiopian Dreams Circus Hub on The Meadows \*\*\*\*

Now in its third year, the Fringe's sole venue dedicated to circus-based performance bears a big responsibility. Or perhaps it's best to call it a Big Top responsibility, given that there is indeed a large tent, The Lafayette, for which Underbelly has programmed a handful of international shows with an all-ages appeal. One of the most captivating is this solid hour of often sensational entertainment

One of the most captivating is this solid hour of often sensational entertainment from Circus Abyssinia, founded by the brothers Bibi and Bichu Tesfamariam. Ethiopian Dreams is based on the siblings' desire to become professional circus performers. Thus we see, at the top of the show, two live boys being advised (on film) by a man in the moon to follow their dreams. Narrative is then

Narrative is then dropped as we're invited to revel in acts by an ensemble drawn from the Konjowoch Troupe of Addis Ababa. Most will knock your socks off. That includes those two extraordinarily limber boys, at the centre of a thrilling opening routine in which they fly and twirl after being flipped and flung about by men standing on the shoulders of other men. I was fascinated by the freakish physical poetry of two young female contortionists who treat each other's rib cages and pelvises like platforms, or curl up together like a beautiful shell while supported by just one pair of hands. This duo is also part of a quartet of women who spin polka-dot cloths on their hands and feet as if the fabric is pizza dough, and later form into an astonishing human totem pole. And then there is a couple whose balancing act has a rare tactile intimacy. The show is a tad padded out, but it leaves you with an uplifting appreciation of what the human body can do. # PERFECT BALAN

Two juggling Ethiopian brothers used the money from roles in a Disney movie remake to start their own dream circus

isney's decision to make a live-action version of one of its animated classics about an airborne baby elephant has helped another reallife circus act's dream to finally take flight.

finally take flight. Ethiopian juggler brothers Bibi and Bichu Tesfamariam used their appearance money in Hollywood director Tim Burton's upcoming remake of *Dumbo* to fund their own long-held plan of starting a circus in their homeland. Now their company, Circus Abyssinia, is headed for a full season at this month's Adelaide Fringe – after a bit of a fumbled attempt at a first takeoff. Confusion over visas meant that Circus

Confusion over visas meant that Circus Abyssinia's planned season at last year's Fringe started late, and that only one of the brothers – Bichu – eventually arrived here. "We managed to do a show without him," Bichu says of his older brother Bibi. Extra

measures were taken to ensure there was no

repeat of the problem this year. "The first time, we were in a lot of trouble getting to Australia," Bichu laughs. "Hopefully this time it will be easier." getting The brothers' scenes for Dumbo, which will

arrive on screens at the end of March, were shot on some of the world's biggest soundstages at Pinewood Studios in London, inside which the film's circus tents and their environs were created.

environs were created. "It's a very exciting project. We never thought we would be in a big Tim Burton movie...but what an experience, to be treated likestars," Bichu says. "It was just amazing, this completely different world to what we have experienced before. We were involved for seven months

shooting. Pretty much every single day, we were in the studio. We were part of the travelling circus, the Medici family."

Danny DeVito plays Max Medici, ringmaster and owner of the circus into which Dumbo is born, that is then taken over by ruthless entrepreneur V.A. Valdemere (Michael Keaton). Coincidentally, Dumbo is the first project that DeVito, Keaton and Burton have all worked together since Batman Returns in 1992. Batman Returns in 1992.

"What an exciting project, sharing the stage

and the screen with such big actors," Bichu says. The brothers even feature, among the other circus performers, on the Dumbo poster.

Without any assistance from the UK Arts Council or other funding, the Tesfamariam brothers say their payments from *Dumbo* were "100 per cent" what enabled them to start Circus Abyssinia. "It was meant to be. We had the opportunity we desided used to be the mercement

and it was going to go toward Circus Abyssinia, and look at where we are now," Bichu says.

"Me and my brother ... even when we were young, what we wanted was to run away with the circus.

"But there isn't any circus where we started. Only on the TV would you see circus with jugglers and acrobats.

jugglers and acrobats. "To get out in Europe and work on one of these big circuses, once we achieved that ... there were a lot of dreamers still back in Ethiopia, so we had to give an opportunity for them as well." As children growing up in Jimma, the largest city in southwest Ethiopia, Bibi and Bichu had an uplikaki introduction to circus

Bichu had an unlikely introduction to circus training

"It was in our school break. One of our French-Canadian teachers was doing juggling

and we saw him," the younger brother recalls. "We used do tumbling and stuff like that, as an after-school activity, but we'd never juggled before. We were fascinated when we saw him juggling three oranges and we just asked him, 'How do you do this? Is it magic?'

"So he showed us, and the next day we came back ... 'Can you juggle this? Can you juggle that?

"Then he gave us the first video and said 'Have a look at this'. It was *Saltimbanco* (by Cirque du Soleil). We saw that and it was like, wow – this was exactly what we wanted to be."

n Ethiopia, the boys couldn't even get access to proper circus materials, such as juggling balls, so their teacher told them they would be able to make their own by

"We crafted ourselves wooden clubs, then we got in trouble with our mum for cutting our socks in half, putting in seeds and then sewing them back together to make our juggling balls," Bichu laughs.

"The wooden clubs we were juggling with were so heavy and uncomfortable ... that

when we managed to get the proper clubs, they were so easy and it gave us a massive advantage.

The brothers came to England in 1999 for the Brighton Fringe, after touring as part of a group called Circus Ethiopia, and there met Sean Gandini from internationally acclaimed company Gandini Juggling (which brought its show Smash to the Adelaide Fringe in 2015).

"We'd heard about Gandini for a while we denergy about cancing for a wrine ... people kept telling us that you need to meet this guy if you are going to make it." The brothers didn't even know the technical terms Gandini was using to describe

the juggling tricks they were performing – although he was particularly impressed by one of their routines in which two clubs remain in the air while three more are being juggled.

Pretty much, he offered us a job the next day. Since then, he's been mentoring us and we've been working for him on the side as well, while we do Circus Abyssinia." By attending Circus Abyssinia, audiences

are not only experiencing a different culture through circus, but also helping the families of the performers back in Ethiopia.



"We try to rotate our artists and give them opportunity, but there's a core group of eight," Bichu says. "With this company, they have changed not

just their lives but their families' and friends' lifestyles, even paid their brother's tuition fees for school. Alemayehu (Mulugeta) bought his family a house, and Danny (Gezahegn) is about to buy his first minibus for public transport."

Perhaps not surprisingly, Circus Abyssinia's show is called *Ethiopian Dreams*. The project grew out of the Circus Wingate school they began sponsoring in the Ethiopian capital Addis Ababa in 2010, "to circu bedurbet we seture hed"

give back what we never had". "There's a couple of African circuses but what makes us different is that, even though what makes us unferent is that, even though we use some European tricks, the way we put it together is that we arrange it with Ethiopian music and dance," Bichu says. "Plus there's a storyline going through it, which is my and my brother's story ... how all the dreamers got together and created this show to inception the concertions."

# SARREGUEMINES Cirque **Bibi et Bichu mettent** l'Éthiopie en scène

Ce dimanche, la scène de l'hôtel de ville prendra des accents éthiopiens. La troupe Circus Abyssinia y proposera un show unique en son genre. Les deux frères fondateurs, Bibi et Bichu Tesfamariam, expliquent leur vision du cirque, eux qui viennent d'un pays où la pratique est d'ordinaire peu répandue.

Vous êtes précurseurs du cirque en Éthiopie. Pourquoi avoir créé cette troupe ?

Bibi et Bichu Tesfama-riam : « Nous avons découvert le cirque lorsque notre professeur de français nous a montré une vidéo du Cirque du soleil. En Ethopie, le cirque est pratiqué, mais pas de la même façon qu'en Europe. C'est plus une tradition sociale qu'une forme d'art. C'est une façon de partager du temps ensemble. Nous avons décidé de créer notre troupe lorsque nous sommes retournés en Éthiopie une fois adultes en pensant à tous les enfants que nous avons rencontrés et qui rêvaient de faire du cirque sans avoir l'opportunité d'être des professionnels. Comme nous lorsque nous étions gamins ... »

#### pour l'Éthiopie ?

« Absolument. Nous voulons partager la musique et les traditions artistiques d'Éthiopie. Nous souhaitons bannir les stéréotypes et les représentations inexactes et archaïques que les pays occidentaux peuvent avoir sur la culture et le mode de vie en

Afrique. Lors de ce spectacle, le public va expérimenter l'Éthiopie contemporaine, son héritage et ses talents. »

#### Quel genre de cirque proposez-vous?

« Notre spectacle représente la réalisation des rêves de membres de notre troupe. Il s'inspire de leur histoire. Il parle du pouvoir et de l'importance des rêves dans un monde trop souvent marqué par le cynisme et le doute. Nous imaginons un cirque qui entraîne un véritable changement social et exprime des idées à travers les arts physiques. Même s'il débute par une scène de dialogue, nous privilégions les histoires racontées par d'autres moyens que la parole. »

Qu'est-ce qui vous semble le plus important dans cette pratique ?

« La passion et la confian-

ce. Si l'on se passionne pour la performance et que l'on a une vraie confiance en ses coéquipiers, on peut réaliser des prouesses. Le talent, la discipline et le sens du spectacle sont bien sûr cruciaux également. Avec tout ça, ensemble, on peut engendrer quelque chose d'extraordinaire sur scène. »

Vous avez ouvert une école de cirque en Éthiopie. C'est le début d'une longue tradition dans votre pays?

Nous aimerions ! Durant la dernière décennie, le cirque est devenu un phénomène social de plus en plus im-portant en Éthiopie. Lentement, il devient un domaine professionnel à part entière. Nous sommes impatients de voir encore plus d'artistes de cirque éthiopiens jeter leur chapeau sur la scène internationale. » Alexandre ROL

#### 5 good reasons to visit the Passages Festival in Metz (France, May 2019)

Le festival engagé Passages revient à Metz du 10 au 19 mai avec du théâtre, de la danse, du cirque, des concerts et de la poésie. Pour la première fois, la Biennale invite des spectacles venus de pays africains et des Caraïbes. Voici cinq bonnes raisons d'y aller.

## 1. On y va pour voir des spectacles du monde entier

Passages n'est plus le festival des théâtres à l'Est de l'Europe mais le festival qui « relie les mondes ». Cette année, il invite 330 artistes venusde 20 pays différents avec 30 propositions artistiques. Il y aura du théâtre, de la danse, de la poésie et des concerts. « Ces spectacles sont des fenêtres ouvertes sur le monde qui permettent de repartir moins ignorants », affirme Hocine Chabira, directeur d'un festival qui lutte contre le repli sur soi. Cette année, les artistes viendront du Maroc, de Turquie, d'Irak, de Syrie, du Liban, du Burkina Faso, d'Éthiopie, du Togo, de Congo-Brazzaville, d'Europe et de France, notamment de Guyane et de la Martinique.

## 2. On y va pour l'ambiance festival

Le cœur du festival battra sur la place de la République à Metz, qui accueillera des spectacles sous chapiteau. Il y aura aussi des expositions de photographies, dont celles de commercants messins prises par Claude Somot et celles de Nicolas Derné qui a fait le tour des carnavals des Caraïbes. On pourra trouver des livres en lien avec la thématique du festival, voir des courts-métrages proposés par l'association les Courtisans et écouter des créations radiophoniques de RFI dans un transat.

#### 3. On y va pour briser ses clichés

C'est une nouveauté ! En marge des spectacles, Serge Mboukou, anthropologue et professeur de philosophie, animera des "apéros-déconstruction" avec un artiste programmé. Ses thèmes : l'art africain se démasque (11 mai à 18 h), Noir n'est pas mon métier (12 mai à 12 h), L'Europe hantée (16 mai à 18 h), Pourquoi tant d'Antillais à La Poste ? (19 mai, 11 h).

4. On y va pour partager

#### un moment en famille

On ne manquera pas Musée Bombana de Kokologo, un specta-cle franco-burkinabé qui pose un autre regard sur l'Afrique de la débrouille en présentant une collection d'objets farfelus. On découvrira également la première d'Ethiopian Dreams du Circus Abyssinia, 19 danseurs et contorsionnistes qui défient la loi de la gravité.

#### 5. On y va pour ses concerts gratuits

Cette année, le festival proposera

à 22 h des concerts gratuits. À l'affiche : la chanteuse et percussionniste Lucia de Carvalho (10 mai), la musicienne aux influences haï-tiennes Mélissa Laveaux (11 mai) et 7Son@ta, un groupe de jeunes percussionnistes guadeloupéens (16 mai).

La semaine se poursuivra avec la guitariste française aux origines congolaises Mary May (17 mai) et la première représentante féminine du « deejaying » en Tunisie, Missy Ness (18 mai).

# Bibi and Bichu's Biography

The story of Bibi and Bichu, whose lives *Ethiopian Dreams* is surreally based on, began some twenty years ago on the streets of Jimma, with two young brothers flipping and tumbling and wowing the crowds. The brothers dreamed of joining the circus, but no circuses ever rolled into town, only rumours and televised glimpses from lands overseas. At 10 years old, inspired by these glimpses, Bibi and Bichu were sowing seeds into their socks and carving their own juggling clubs from blocks of wood. Self-taught and determined, they honed their skills on the city streets where they performed for the sheer love of performing.



They came to England in 1998 to perform at Brighton Fringe and stunned audiences and artists alike with their juggling skills. After making their home in the UK, Bibi and Bichu trained at the National Centre for Circus Arts, where they met Sean Gandini, director of Gandini Juggling, who cast them in the Millennium Dome celebrations, *Big* (2000), and later, in *Smashed* (2012 and 2016) and *Mozart's Glow* (2017). Sean has been a friend and mentor to them ever since.

Bibi and Bichu have performed in thousands of shows that span the spectrum of the circus arts: from CBeebies' 'Justin's House' in London's 02 Arena to the Olivier Award-winning ENO production of *Akhnaten* (2016). From 2002-2016, they were also resident jugglers at Giffords Circus, touring the south of England with shows that told and retold stories through the medium of circus.

Interspersing live gigs with numerous TV appearances, they've juggled on the BBC, ITV and Channel 4, on 'The Paul O'Grady Show', 'Ant and Dec's Saturday Night Takeaway', 'Blue Peter' and Sky One's 'What's Up TV'. In 2017, they were even cast in Disney's most recent live-action movie, Tim Burton's *Dumbo* (released March 2019), where they feature heavily in the circus scenes.

In 2010, they returned to Ethiopia as young men and found many would-be circus artists just like them, clamouring for audience and opportunity. So they started funding a circus school in the capital city called Circus Wingate. Though explosive with talent, with extraordinarily high standards (artists train there under Ethiopian gymnastics coach Solomon Tadese), the school was so sorely lacking in funds it was about to close. With Bibi and Bichu's help it's now a thriving and steadily growing charitable institution, with 150 students on roll and counting. The brothers soon started extending their help to other circus schools in the district, including Bita Brothers Circus and Sheger Circus.

Given how they started, and how much they owe to the help and the kindness of fellow artists, it's very important to Bibi and Bichu to provide the same kind of support to other circus 'dreamers'. The brothers soon found that their dream of joining the circus had turned into something else – the desire to create something more, and to change the ways of circus in Ethiopia. In 2017 Bibi and Bichu teamed up with the extraordinary artists at these circus schools to create *Circus Abyssinia*, a show which stages the creation of the world's first Ethiopian circus and weaves the dreams of its cast and creators.


Since debuting to a standing ovation in London at Kingston's Rose Theatre in 2017, the show has enjoyed two sell-out seasons at Edinburgh Fringe, performed highly successful runs in Singapore, at the Underbelly Festival in London, and at the 2018 Adelaide Fringe, where it won the 'Pick of the Fringe' Award in its opening week. The cast was even invited to perform on the 2017 Royal Variety Performance, where Circus Abyssinia shared a stage with Cirque du Soleil. Bibi says seeing this was a 'moment of genuine emotion, of absolute pride. We were pinching ourselves'.

In 2019 Circus Abyssinia completed its first world tour, including Australia, the UK, the Fuji Rock Festival in Japan, the Sziget Festival in Budapest, a theatre and festival tour of Europe, a performance residency at NYU in Abu Dhabi and a 5 week run at the Children's Theatre Company in Minneapolis.

Circus Abyssinia is currently planning the tour of their brand-new second show, *Tulu*. It is show that celebrates the true tale of an icon: featuring dazzling feats of speed and flight, and rocking with the exuberant joy of its cast, *Tulu* depicts the journey of Ethiopian legend Derartu Tulu, the first African woman to win Olympic gold.

# The Circus Abyssinia Troupe

The Circus Abyssinia Troupe hails from Addis Ababa and trained at Circus Wingate, one of Ethiopia's few successful and expertly regulated circus schools.



The troupe all trained under former Ethiopian gymnast coach, Solomon Tadesse. Most of its members joined as children and have retained an attitude of childlike joy and wonder towards their craft which makes watching every performance feel like it's both their first and last time on stage.

What makes the troupe truly extraordinary is their brilliant magnetic rapport, both with each other in the ring, and with the audience. This is nowhere more apparent than when the whole team performs a hand-vaulting act comprising precarious balances and near-collision, executed with an abandon that belies the level of trust and skill which makes such uninhibited acrobatic display possible.

The troupe's burgeoning circus careers have changed their lives and the lives of their families for the better in very real, significant ways. The troupe's circus success has meant they have been able to support their families back home, paying for their schooling, buying them houses to live in, and helping them become self-sufficient – some artists' families have been able to establish farms, and are growing crops to support themselves.

#### WORKSHOPS AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In the meantime, the Abyssinia troupe enjoys participating in community outreach activities while on tour. The whole cast engages with local youth and circus communities through class visits and communal meals, and frequently hold workshops for all abilities on site or at local circus schools, using the common language of circus and dance as a medium for a special kind of cultural exchange.

In classes ranging from 30 minutes to 120 minutes, the cast of Circus Abyssinia share their skills of contortion, juggling, dance and acrobatics with amateurs and professionals alike. The age range for these classes is generally 7 years and up.

# Circus Abyssinia: Ethiopian Dreams

## Synopsis

Surrealist and joy-driven, accompanied by a soundscape that draws on Ethiopia's rich musical past and present, Circus Abyssinia is a tale of the circus, told through stunning ensemble feats of acrobatics, contortion and juggling, all performed to the irresistible rhythms of Ethiopian music and song. Inspired by the story of Bibi and Bichu, the show follows the journey of two little Ethiopian brothers, whose one wish - to run away with the circus - is granted by the Man in the Moon.

Transported by their lunar benefactor, the boys navigate – and participate in! – the daredevil wonders of circus. They are far from alone; the ring, like the spotlight of a moon, reveals glimpses of other stories and dreams: acrobatic narratives that unfold without words, and intertwine with their own.

These narrative threads entwine, even threaten to ensnare, but ultimately lead towards an extraordinary possibility: an out-and-out Ethiopian circus and a phenomenal new Ethiopian tradition.

# Director's Note

All of us in Circus Abyssinia grew up dreaming of joining the circus, but for all its rich and vibrant traditions, Ethiopia has no circus tradition, and very few acrobats ever make a living by their skills. Circus Abyssinia is the first Ethiopian circus created by and for Ethiopian artists, and my hope is that our show will help create a space in the world for many more to come.

I think part of the power of the show is the way it highlights the importance of dreams in a world too often marked by cynicism and doubt. The show is about the boyhood dreams of my brother and I, but it's also about every artist back in Ethiopia and everywhere – those who know that to perform is to be happy, and that nothing can compare with sharing the beats and excitement of acrobatic daring and dance with an audience.

And that's what it's really all about. Our show explores Ethiopia's colourful artistic heritage, and the traditions that set us apart, but at its heart is a celebration of the dreams and joys common to all cultures and continents, and that bring us together.
